From the most everyday objects to the most extraordinary creations, it's hard to imagine a world without plastic. It's so universal it's almost invisible. Yet plastic shapes our lives.

The MyPlastic project shines a new light on this material by exploring in short films the often highly personal relationship we have with plastic.

From a therapeutic salad spinner that whirls like a train. To a cheap garden chair that becomes a sanctuary in a burned out compound in the Congo. To a penguin deity that feeds off plankton and brews the best beer, ever.

These are the plastic stories of designers, humanitarian documentary makers, scenographers, animators, monster makers, academics and astronauts. Stories of objects that are loaded with emotions, memories and meaning.

Joe Rush

Joe Rush is the founder of The Mutoid Waste Company, who use discarded and found objects to create post-apocalyptic sculpture. In this film he talks about inspiration, tractor theft and the power of autonomous design.

Pete Fowler's work blurs the boundaries between art, design and illustration and is inspired by his love of psychedelica, music and monsters. In this short film he discusses magic beer, camouflaged penguin deities and the intoxicating smell of a new plastic toy.

Jim Lovell

Captain James Lovell is a retired Navy Officer and astronaut, who captained 4 space missions, including the ill-fated Apollo 13. In this short film he talks about the common bond of flight, hitching a ride on the moon's gravity and trying not to tell Tom Hanks what to do.

Working as a scenographer, director and writer for the stage, Pamela Howard has realised over 200 productions in a career spanning 5 decades. In this short film she talks about form and function, Swiss trains and the recuperative value of the Triumph salad spinner.

Roy Brown

Roy Brown is an artist. In this short film he talks about drawing in a 3D space, feeing like a robot and when the only creative response is to take things apart.

Eliza Bonham Carter is the Curator and Head of the Royal Academy Schools. In this film she talks about functionality, beauty, and restocking her supply of paperclips.


"I got to the end of my little stash about a year ago"


